## It Begins...

The Gospel of Luke 1:1-24

Notes about the author, good to know:

- A. According to Tradition, Luke was a Gentile (non-Jew), as Paul alludes to (Col. 4:11-14). This makes Luke the \_\_\_\_\_\_ gentile to pen any books of the Bible, which is a strong statement in itself to the intended scope of the gospel, missed by the majority of Jews until the coming end times.
- B. Very little is known about Luke. He never included much information about himself. However we do know that Both historians Eusebius and Jerome identified him as a native of \_\_\_\_\_\_, which is likely why so much of the book of Acts (which Luke also wrote) is centered around Antioch.
- C. Luke was a frequent companion of \_\_\_\_\_\_, who referred to Luke as a "physician" (Col. 4:14). His interest in medical phenomena is evident in the focus he gave to Jesus' *healing* ministry through this book.
- D. Luke dedicated his works to "The Most Excellent Theophilus" (lit. ref "Lover of God"). This way of addressing him may be a nickname he uses due to Theophilus possibly being a well-known \_\_\_\_\_\_ dignitary, perhaps one of Caesar's household that turned to Christ. Although he wrote this to Theo, he no doubt envisioned this to go to a much wider audience and indeed it did as God authorized it as one of the four official gospels. Luke likely wrote from Rome near Paul.
- E. By the way Luke begins his letter, it seems apparent that he himself was not an eyewitness nor one of the apostles, but being a doctor and thinker, he was a vessel chosen by God to bring unique historical information about the events of Jesus that we \_\_\_\_\_ see in the other gospels.

V. 1-4- The Purpose and Method of Luke's gospel...(read 1-4)

- 1. Luke was a natural \_\_\_\_\_\_ of the gospel and had compiled a careful record.
- 2. **Matthew & Mark were already written**, but no doubt influenced Luke's writings, but as we see that he had unique

entries, which shows us that he was \_\_\_\_\_ just plagiarizing from the other two.

- 3. **Thus, Luke did not get his information from hearsay or rumors**, but from \_\_\_\_\_\_ eyewitnesses of these events; people who are still alive that were there when it happened!
  - a. This is key when understanding the validity and authority of God's Word (**2 Pet. 1:16-18**). Eyewitness accounts matter greatly. They \_\_\_\_\_\_ you and I, forever, to the "actual event" described.
- 4. "So that you may know the \_\_\_\_\_\_ truth about the things you have been taught"
  - a. While we live in a world that likes to slur the lines, so no one can be told they are wrong, \_\_\_\_\_\_ and exact truth matter according to God. Why? Because what we believe gives us license for how we live (1 Tim. 4:16), and as we have seen, a half-truth distortion can drastically affect \_\_\_\_\_ and outcomes.

The story begins... (V. 5-24) (read thru...)

- 1. This is Herod the Great... the first in the line of Herods (see slide).
- 2. Division of Abijah... The temple priesthood was organized into \_\_\_\_\_ divisions, with each division serving twice a year for one week (1 Chron. 24:4-19). Abijah's was the 8th division.
- 3. Daughters of Aaron... Both Elizabeth & Zecharias were from priestly lineage. This highlights their interest in the affairs of the \_\_\_\_\_.
- 4. The description of them as righteous in the sight of God does not mean they were sinless, it just refers to their on-going, heart-felt observance of the law. "Blameless" & "Sinless" are \_\_\_\_\_ the same thing. Their lack of children is not because of sin, but their circumstances beautifully set the scene for the miraculous grace to come to them...
  - a. This teaches us that problems are prerequisites for miracles.
- 5. **Gabriel, the Angel chosen by God to deliver the news** (lit. "strong man of God") both to Zecharias & Mary… Zecharias initially \_\_\_\_\_, which brings about God's discipline.
